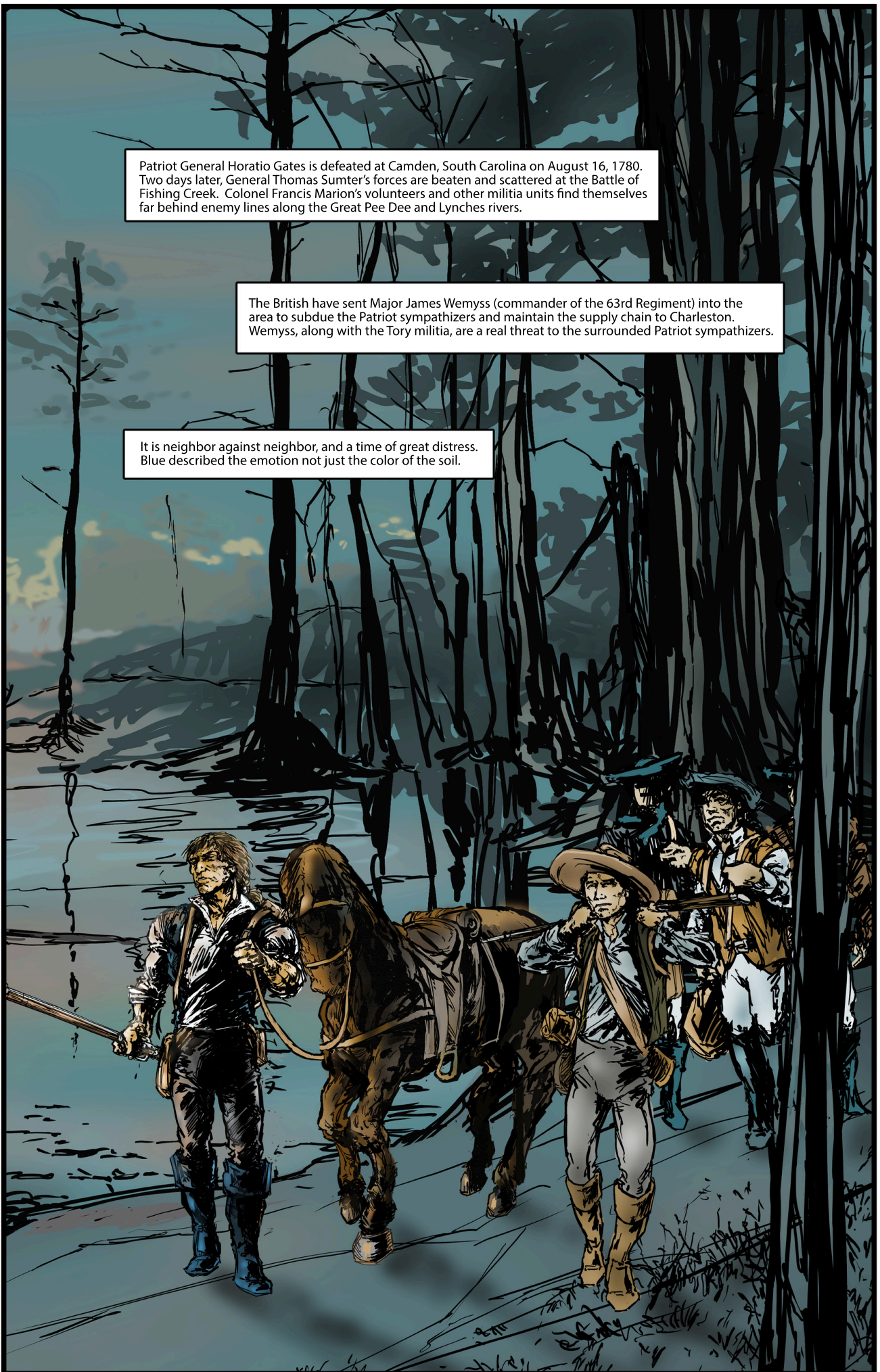


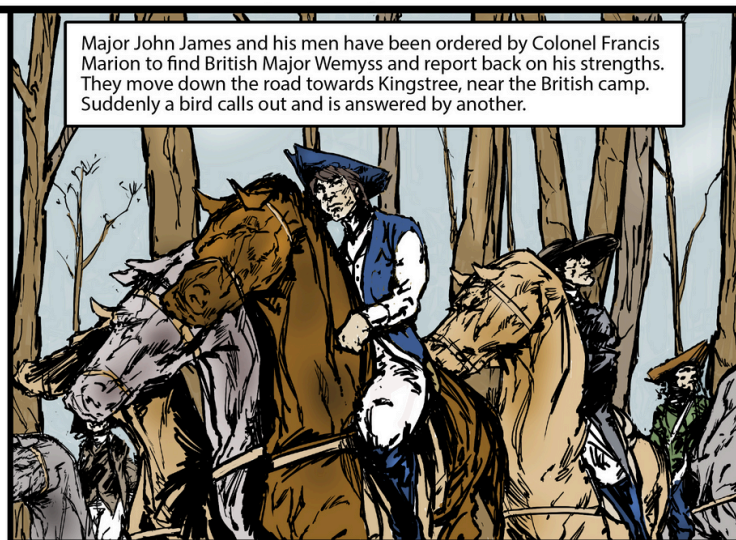
Patriot General Horatio Gates is defeated at Camden, South Carolina on August 16, 1780. Two days later, General Thomas Sumter's forces are beaten and scattered at the Battle of Fishing Creek. Colonel Francis Marion's volunteers and other militia units find themselves far behind enemy lines along the Great Pee Dee and Lynches rivers.

The British have sent Major James Wemyss (commander of the 63rd Regiment) into the area to subdue the Patriot sympathizers and maintain the supply chain to Charleston. Wemyss, along with the Tory militia, are a real threat to the surrounded Patriot sympathizers.

It is neighbor against neighbor, and a time of great distress. Blue described the emotion not just the color of the soil.
